Our dedicated ballot clerks, many of whom return election after election, are the true secret to our success; we are grateful for your willingness to step up and volunteer. Two final shout-outs go to Town Moderator Jonathan Kipp, whose ongoing leadership is a key part of this well-oiled machine, and to our ALERT volunteers, who tirelessly work to keep parking safe and organized.

After this race of an election season, you would think that we would take time to rest and recuperate. To some degree, that's true, but it's also full steam ahead to put in place everything voters approved. In the voting booth, Londonderry is steadfast in its support of our "Big Three" departments: Fire, Police, and Public Works & Engineering. This year was no exception. The community approved funding for public works vehicles and roadway maintenance, an additional police prosecutor, and additional firefighters to enhance the delivery of advanced life support-level care. In this issue, we're featuring a bit about each of the Big Three to get you better acquainted with the departments who work so hard to serve our residents.

As we embark on the final quarter of fiscal year 2024, I'm grateful to the people of Londonderry for their continued support for the important work the Town does to serve the community. I'm excited for our future initiatives, and I can't wait to share the progress with you here.

On February 8, 2024, the Londonderry Fire Department held its first recognition ceremony since the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to the long time since the last ceremony, there were many to recognize. Since the previous recognition ceremony:

- Eight Firefighters completed their probationary periods.
- Two Telecommunications Officers (TCOs) completed their probationary periods.
- Eight Firefighters were promoted to Lieutenant and completed their probationary periods.
- Six of the eight members of the command staff were promoted one or more times.

Speakers included Town Council chair John Farrell, Fire Chief Bo Butler, Local 3160 Union President Chris Schofield, and Town Manager Mike Malaguti.

Speakers lauded the firefighters for their dedication and service, while thanking their family members in the audience for their support and sacrifice. Town Clerk Sherry Farrell administered the oaths to those being sworn in.

The Fire Department also recognized several civilians for their contributions to the organization or acts of heroism in the community. LFD swore in Dr. Marc Grossman as Chief Medical Officer and celebrated the contributions of retiring Londonderry School District custodian Charlie Wilton. Katherine O'Brien, Erica Lussier, and Patrick Hills were recognized for their lifesaving efforts during a medical emergency at Hannafords. Tim Porter and LHS girls' soccer team members Steph Gervais, Abby Jones, Lyndi McKinnon, and Kate Sloper were recognized for their response to a medical emergency at the West Road soccer fields.

DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT: LPD's Airport Division



Police Captain Patrick Cheetham, Airport Division Commander, provides an introduction to this important - and unique - aspect of policing in Londonderry.

On September 1, 2023 I took command of the Londonderry Police Department Airport Division at the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport after having served as the Services Division Commander for nearly five years. In my first six months, we experienced an expected increase in VIP movements as the New Hampshire Primary approached. Aside from our daily duties of protecting and serving the people, places, and things on or around the airport property, we coordinated VIP movements with the Manchester Police and New Hampshire State Police almost weekly.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

For the first time in a long time, we saw nearly half of the Presidential cabinet make visits to or pass through "MHT," which required specialized security assignments to ensure the safe and efficient travel through MHT. Most dignitaries, to include our own Congressional delegation, fly commercially just like you and me. Some, however, are afforded small protection details and require special escorts, which are nearly almost always handled by on-duty staff and with no overtime.

We are proud to have served here at MHT since June 2006 and I am proud to say that I was an officer here from the start. When we took over law enforcement responsibilities at MHT in 2006, I had four years on with LPD and never envisioned finishing my career as the Airport Division Commander. But having been here a short six months, I wouldn't have it any other way. We get to meet people and experience aviation from an entirely different perspective than the normal traveler through. I continue to be impressed with airport leadership in both private sector airlines and tenants as well as with City of Manchester Airport employees.

PREPARING FOR A RAINY SPRING

April showers bring May flowers...but they can also bring a whole lot of flooded streets! Even a few inches of excessive water on roadways is dangerous, as it can cause driver to lose control or it can conceal hidden hazards.



As you prepare your home and yard for summer, here are a few things you can do to make sure your neighborhood stays as safe as possible:

- Clear off grates covered by debris (see above) so water can flow into basins.
- Dispose of yard waste responsibly, such as at the Drop-Off Center, rather than letting it accumulate in the swales (depressions) alongside the road where it can obstruct the established drainage paths.
- If you have a culvert under your driveway, make cleaning out the opening and the outfall part of your yard maintenance routine.




Assessing Deadline!

Do I need to license my dog if they are too young to have received their rabies vaccination?

No, when the dog has reached 4 months in age and is eligible for their vaccination you will then need to obtain a license for them.

My dog just got their first vaccination; how do I get them licensed?

By coming into the office with the valid rabies certificate, or by mailing a copy of the rabies certificate to the Town Clerks Office with a check made payable to "Town of Londonderry" for the appropriate fees.


