32	asked if the town wanted their results after their well was tested. Smith said absolutely.			
33	Chairman Farrell stated that we need data and we won't hold back once we have all the			
34	results. We have to work inside the legal system and we have to put pressure to expedite

Fromuth spoke about HB 286, which now enables the Town Council to essentially group all of the residence together who are on Eversourse and put them into a one point of energy contract with a third party supplier. The point of contract comes down to the Town Council so the Council would be able to negotiate on behalf of the residents and their accounts. It gives the ability to make sure it is a customer friendly contract. See attached PowerPoint for information. Chairman Farrell stated that this is something the council would be interested in, saving the residents money and give money back. Chairman Farrell gave direction for Kevin to work with Fromuth and Carter to put together a plan. Smith presented the Council with a draft of a potential Resolution that the Council can adopted at a later meeting, regarding the tax payer act. Smith stated that there are three components to this plan. The first one would be to apply one million dollars against the tax rate for the next four years, beginning in 2020 using Undesignated Fund Balance. It would appropriate two-hundred and fifty thousand dollars per year, beginning in calendar year 2020 through calendar year 2024. The Fund Balance could not fall below recommended balance during that time. The second would be that there will be no townwide CIP request until at least FY 2024, if necessary. The third component would be no new full-time personnel request until FY 2023, unless they are at least 50% grant or other outside revenue funded in year one, expulsing retirements or department reorganizations. Chairman Farrell stated that this is going in the right direction.



- 1. Decide on an Energy Plan: The leadership of the community works with a consulting firm (FEL) to develop an Renewables, RECs, metering, DSM (Demand Side Management) or even forming your own Community Supplier energy plan for their community. These plans will vary by community priorities such as Cost Savings, Local (local hydro, solar, etc.)
- 2. Procurement and Rate-Setting: FEL assembles the supplier bids via RFP, presents top options and makes their community and supplier move to implementation. (Supplier Vetting – learning from past mistakes of other recommendations to community. Community agent chooses supplier with best overall offering and FEL,
- accounts already under 3 rd-party supply and accounts that decide to opt out. (Data collection, aggregation notices 3. Implementation: FEL works with chosen supplier and LDC (Utility) to enroll community accounts, eliminating & opt-out cards, public education meeting, processing opt-ins/opt-outs, enrollment)



Major Findings


- Inventoried all surface water bodies
- Five impairments
- Inventoried the locations of groundwater aquifers
- Inventoried threats to surface and groundwater
- Land use (46% forested, 26% residential)
- Impervious cover (10.3% impervious)
- Sewer/septic (90% septic)
- Landfills, Superfund sites, etc.
- Inventoried current drinking water usage/supply
- Public water suppliers = 74% of residents
- Community water supply wells = 9%
- Private wells = 18%
- Assessed future drinking water demand
- Expected to increase ~21% by 2040



Recommendations

To Address Future Water Demand

- Work with existing water suppliers
- Conduct a study to assess Town's groundwater supply
- Assess Scobie Pond



Recommendations

To Address Surface Water Quality Impairments

- Assess existing surface water quality data and collect additional data as needed
- Develop watershed-based plans for impaired waters


